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Access for all was the inspiration behind the refurbishment and reimaging of the Town's much-loved Rosemead Playground. Officially declared open by Town Mayor Councillor David Chace on Saturday 18th December, 10-year-old Lloyd Parvin-Blackstone cut the ribbon. Lloyd's views helped in the redesign of the playground, which was delivered by Littlehampton Town Council and constructed by Sutcliffe Play.

Designed for children up to the age of 14 and including specific features to ensure happy and productive play, Lloyd, who has autism, wrote to the Council expressing his wish for a playground where everyone could play, even if they were confined to a wheelchair – "I think parks should be for everyone, the disabled and abled. We like playing together."

Listening and acting on Lloyd's thoughts, which echoed many others heard during the consultation process, LTC briefed Sutcliffe Play accordingly. Funded from Capital Receipts Reserves the project cost a total of £137,398 which includes a generous contribution of £12,000 from Anesco.

Chair of the Community
Resources Committee, Councillor
Billy Blanchard-Cooper said: "I am
absolutely thrilled with the playground.
Sutcliffe Play has managed to create a fun,
safe and inclusive space for children of all ages
and abilities. This new facility will bring much life to
Rosemead Park and provide hours of fun for children and
families. After the year we have had, it is nice to end it
with something so positive for the whole community."

Bear hugs to remember Chris



A lover of teddy bears whose final show as President of the Littlehampton Musical Comedy Society was Goldilocks and the Three Bears, the late and well-respected Councillor Chris Blanchard-Cooper now has a lasting and unique memorial in Mewsbrook Park. Unveiled in September, a trio of wooden teddy bears were dedicated to the former Arun District Councillor, who sadly passed away unexpectedly last Spring. More than £3,500 was raised towards the statues, which incorporate references to Chris' involvement with the Bonfire Society and Friends of Mewsbrook Park, his widow Billy hopes the bears will bring smiles to many for years to come.





You're hired!

Apprenticeships provide real opportunities for young people trying to enter the employment market. Three apprentices have been valued members of the Town Council's team during the past 18 months and each has found the experience rewarding.

"I have gained many skills, but most of all I have grown in confidence through the experience. Working with a variety of people in the Town has developed both my communication skills and confidence, whilst learning a lot of

transferrable skills which will be valuable through my career," said Emily Jordan, who has been supporting Committee & Administration.



"You learn on the go and it also prepares you for what the industry itself is like," agreed Chloe Brown-Felpts, who has worked in Events. "I now have the skills to successfully plan an event; I have gained knowledge in running websites and

social media accounts, and admin skills. I work closely with members of the community which has really helped my confidence, as I am always speaking to new people and liaising with contractors and entertainers. The pandemic forced us to cancel our annual events, so I have learnt new skills in the world of virtual events."



"Even if you're a little older, and have been out of school for a little while, it can still be a valuable hands-on experience that can take you from one career step to another," added Jay Thomson, who has been working with

Corporate & Business Support.

Each expressing their gratitude to the Town Council and their colleagues, in turn the Council is appreciative of the trio's hard work and their positive attitudes.

In September 2020, the Government launched new incentives to help businesses to invest in the skills they need to recover and grow as part of the Government's Plan for Jobs. Employers have until 31 March 2021 to sign up for the apprentice cash boost and are being offered up to £2,000 for each new apprentice they hire.

That's the advice of NHS Flu Champion Councillor Mike Northeast, who is urging others to get that vital Flu shot.

"I became a Flu/vaccine Champion because I wanted to dispel myths and change perceptions about the Flu jab and COVID-19 vaccine whilst making people aware of their availability to all adults", explained Mike.

Pointing out the importance of getting a flu jab Mike says "as the current campaign states, it's not 'Just' the Flu, it's a killer that takes thousands of lives every year and puts many more in hospital. The best protection is to have a Flu jab, which is free for a lot more people now."

He urged all residents to check their eligibility for the jab, adding that immune systems would benefit from being clear of Flu before the COVID jab is administered.

Please don't contact your GP about your COVID-19 vaccination, they will contact you.

Mike told Progress, "Vaccination is the way to beat both these killer viruses. It's quick, it's easy and it saves lives. Grab that jab!"

Littlehampton Town Council's

Budget 2021/22

The Town Council has agreed its budget for the forthcoming year and like previous years key services such as allotments, grants and events have been protected whilst also allowing new facilities and services to be brought forward.

Speaking at Full Council, Chair of the Policy & Finance Committee, Councillor Dr James Walsh KStJ, said: "Like many other Councils, our income has been impacted by the pandemic with losses being largely offset by the cancelling of last year's events, this year's budget envisages a full programme of events being delivered. The budget also provides the financial package to support the new capital project, namely the new youth facility and the forthcoming North Littlehampton Community Centre."

The Council has agreed a 2% increase in Council Tax for a Band D Council Taxpayer. This represents a £2.53 per annum/just under 5p per week increase.

The Council is spending £1,138,099 from its reserves, this is excluded from the Council Tax. £1,041,193 of this is for the new youth centre. These figures are for the Town Council's part of the Council Tax, for other elements residents need to check their Council tax bill when it arrives from Arun District Council.

Cash boost for organisations

Charities and not for profit organisations have been especially hard hit by the pandemic, with all but very few fundraising events cancelled. But the Town Council's Grant Aid fund will continue to support local groups and charities in 2021.

A local resource that has seen a significant demand for its services during the pandemic, last year's beneficiaries include Littlehampton & District Food Bank and Life Centre, where the funding will enable it to provide free specialist trauma counselling.
